## Voters' Guide 2025

Hello, Branch 82. We just concluded nominations for Branch 82 officer positions, and we will be having an election for several of them. I was nominated for Branch 82 President and won by acclamation, so I will have the pleasure to serve you as president of this union for another two-year term. Thank you for your confidence in me. I aim to make these next two years ones that will be active and productive while battling the current hostile political climate and the changing post office.

This election, like every election in Branch 82, will be run democratically. That means every single member in good standing will have the right to vote, and every member in good standing will get a ballot in which to vote. With your ballot, you will also receive a self-addressed stamped envelope for you to return it. That's right, our elections are also vote-by-mail!

We will be voting for several important officer positions this year: Vice President, Secretary-Treasurer, Editor, Executive Board At Large (four positions in all), and Trustee (five positions). Also, something new that is happening this election is that we are voting for paid delegates to next year's NALC Biennial National Convention in Los Angeles. All of the delegates you will be voting for are already elected; you are voting on who will have (most of) their travel and per diem paid by the branch. The National Conventions are expensive, and this year we had 43 delegates who were eligible to be paid delegates. We can't afford to take everyone, so we will be voting for the 23 people who will be paid to go. (You will see those 43 names on your ballot.)

I encourage everyone to vote! You may not know all of the candidates, and voting for 23 paid delegates may seem daunting, but I encourage you to do the work, try and learn about the candidates, and take part in the democracy of your union. Not every union runs this way, and not every NALC branch runs every election so democratically as Branch 82. Many branches don't elect their shop stewards. They are appointed by the local president. Here, we want the members to decide who will represent them. Things like democracy or due process rights are not always easy, but those principles are still, in my opinion, the bedrock of our nation, and so it should be in our union. I believe Democracy to be a foundational principle in any labor union. It ensures that members have a voice, decisions are made collectively, and leadership is held accountable. It strengthens a union's legitimacy and effectiveness.

This is one of the more challenging B-Mike issues to put together, and this year, one of the biggest! It is also one of the most important ones. This issue is filled with election ads. In it, you will see an index of the candidates who are running for office. When you are a candidate, the order in which you appear on the ballot is drawn randomly out of a hat. In this issue, our editor Suzanne Miller has tried to stick to that order. It may not be perfect because candidates have submitted different-sized ads. Every candidate has the opportunity to submit a free quarter-page ad in the election issue with the option of paying for a larger ad. The paid officer positions (President, Vice President, and Secretary-Treasurer) get a free full-page ad.

Thank you for reading this, and thank you for taking part in this year's election. It is an important one, and I hope that everyone votes. Read the candidate's election ads. They worked hard to put them together. If, for some reason, you or a member you know don't receive a ballot, please contact Branch 82 for a replacement. Happy union democracy!

My name is Joshua Petty, and I'm honored to be running for Vice President of Branch 82. I bring with me not just years of experience, but a deep commitment to empowering every letter carrier.

I've been with the USPS since 2007. I've served in numerous leadership roles within the union as Union Steward and a Formal A Rep, always focused on one goal: defending our rights, enforcing the contract, and standing shoulder to shoulder with carriers on the workroom floor.

Work closely with the President and branch leadership to take on real responsibility—supporting stewards, grievance handling, and the dispute resolution process.

I've never been afraid to speak truth to power. I've never been too busy to answer a member's question. And I've never forgotten why we're here: to represent the carriers—not management. #### **ABOUT SALLIE:**

Unionism runs in my family. My uncle was part of the sheet metal workers Union in Montana where I grew up. I knew that given the opportunity to join a Union, I was going to. I have been a member of the NALC since my first day over 19 years ago. The NALC provides common ground for carriers from all walks of life.

I have been a steward in my office for 15 years training new stewards at my office as well as the new supervisors and managers that rotate through. I show up and put in the work managing daily grievances for all carriers in my office, without conflict. I have a strong moral and ethical obligation to the carriers and the Union.

I believe that the Vice President position has been underutilized. All grievances pass across this desk allowing for opportunity to communicate with stewards weekly and/or monthly, creating stronger connections between officers and carriers. The VP has a responsibility to the Union and the carriers by sharing knowledge and settlement agreements. 





## **Updates on the ELM 432.32 Arbitration**

We recently received an arbitration award from Arbitrator Lumbley, concerning ELM 432.32 violations. Arbitrator Lumbley awarded affected carriers a total of an additional 100% pay or annual leave credited to their AL balance, at the carriers choice. This award stems from 12 grievances I sent forward, all out of Piedmont Station, in February of 2024, and it took 18 months for them to make their way through Step B, receive a hearing date, go in front of an arbitrator, and await that arbitrators decision. I so terribly wish the process was more swift, and I thank all those who had the patience to wait for the outcome.

What are ELM 432.32 violations? Management violates ELM 432.32 when they work carriers who are not on the Work Assignment or Overtime Desired Lists, more than 11.50 hours over the course of a single day, which includes Part-Time Flexible (PTF) and City Carrier Assistant (CCA) Employees. Section 432.32 of the Employee and Labor Relations Manual (ELM) states:

#### "432.32 Maximum Hours Allowed

Except as designated in labor agreements for bargaining unit employees or in emergency situations as determined by the postmaster general (or designee), employees may not be required to work more than 12 hours in one service day. In addition, the total hours of daily service, including scheduled workhours, overtime, and mealtime, may not be extended over a period longer than 12 consecutive hours. Postmasters and exempt employees are excluded from these provisions."

Management has ignored this section of the ELM for as long as I have been working as a letter carrier, and for much longer than that. It is important to note that there is no default remedy for when management commits this type of infraction. It was only over time that we were able to establish a remedy to pay those affected carriers an additional 50% of their base rate, for the amount of hours they were worked beyond the limitation. Even with the additional 50% remedy, management found little reason to stop committing the violations, as an additional 50% pay does not amount to much in the grand scheme of things.

Across the 12 grievances mentioned above, each representing one week's worth of violations, Piedmont management worked carriers more than 240 hours past the limitations outlined in ELM 432.32. TWO HUNDRED FORTY HOURS. Keep in mind, these were nearly all PTFs, employees in their probation, employees trying to keep a job, employees who are vulnerable. Piedmont management took advantage of all of them. This type of violation never sat well with me, but it became too much, especially since management ignored our requests to provide Piedmont with additional PTFs and vehicles to, at the very least, help relieve some of the excessive overtime that was being worked by those employees. So we stopped settling for the additional 50% and requested an escalated remedy, and of course management did not want to pay it, so the cases went forward.

When trying to remedy any situation, the goal is to always make the affected employee whole, as if the violation had not happened in the first place. Using that logic, I asked myself what would make an employee whole who was forced to work beyond limitations they are never supposed to be worked past, and the answer I found was that they should be credited annual leave. They had their time outside of work stolen from them, and the only way to truly remedy that is to one- give them that time back, and two, ensure that they are paid for it. I also requested that affected carriers- be paid an additional 100% for management continually violating past settlements to no longer work carriers beyond those limits. Although we did not get both, thankfully the arbitrator agreed that the remedy needed to be higher, and decided that a choice between the two, an additional 100% pay or AL, was more than appropriate.

Of course management is less than pleased with this remedy, and they are going to be fighting us on it. We told them if they don't want to pay the money or credit the AL, they can very simply stop working carriers beyond those limitations. But they have not stopped, seemingly don't plan on stopping, and are refusing to pay the remedy for any new violations. We will continue to negotiate and fight for what's owed to carriers put in these situations, and if you are worked more than 11.50 hours in a single day, please make sure to alert your steward or to call the hall to alert an officer.

Reading of the Minutes: Casey English made a motion to dispense with the reading of the minutes and accept them as printed in the B-Mike. Seconded, Richard Shay. Carried.

#### Communications

Membership Report: Regular: 1180, PTF: 205, CCA: 33, Retiree: 493, Gold Card: 93, Management & Other Crafts: 50, New Members: CCA-6, PTF- 8. Total Membership: 2054. Non-Members: 42, Organized: 96.97% Retired: Ryan Whitcome, Waterfront Canceled: Miao Wang, Tigard. Separated: Heath Jones- PTF, Tigard; Stratford Manning- PTF, Oak Grove; Natalie Miller- CCA, Troutdale; Thomas Ross-PTF, Holladay Park; Matthew Trotter- CCA, Hillsboro; Luka Whelchel-PTF, Multnomah; Sierra Grable- PTF, Rose City Park; Madeline Hall- PTF, Troutdale; Drew Peterson- PTF, Aloha; Matthew Waring-PTF, Holladay Park

Secretary-Treasurer's Report: Cody Harris made a motion to pay the bills. Seconded, English. Carried.

#### **Executive Board Expenditure**

Recommendation: Motion: spend up to \$2,000 for chairs, portable dishwasher and benches for out front. Discussion: Rogue Robertson proposed that we amend the recommendation to add an oven, which changed to \$1,000 for running 220 electrical. Amendment accepted. Carried.

Unfinished Business: President Norton explained there are 55 total delegates for the 2026 National Convention in Los Angeles, 43 of whom are paid delegates. He said we do not have enough money to send 43 people paid. E-board recommended to send elected officers plus 15 people who would be voted for on the ballot; Norton said we want to try to do it as democratically as possible. Sec-Treasurer Matt Pierce broke down the expenses: there are 43 paid delegates, 12 unpaid, and \$48,000 set by by-laws. Motion: Wyatt Austin moved to accept the Executive board recommendation to send 10 elected officers and 15 people elected from the delegates list to National

Convention. Seconded: English. Discussion. Brittany Thomas made an amendment to the proposal to include any elected officers equally among the 43 delegates. Seconded: Will Arrowsmith, Discussion, Thomas talked about using rank choice voting. Pierce pointed out issues with the amendment that the sec-treasurer and president must be at the conventions, and ranked choice could be very difficult because ballots must be counted and certified in one day. Thomas amended the amendment to include ranked choice voting. Seconded: Robertson. Vote: amended proposal to take away elected officers and include all paid delegates to vote on- 23 delegates plus president and secretary treasurer. Lois Brumfield pointed out that it would be a hardship to find enough people to count the ballots. Norton said anyone running for office or involved in the election cannot help with counting. Colin Moore called for the question. Seconded: English. Carried. Vote on Amendment to proposal that we separate officers to make it a vote for all delegates other than president and sec-treasurer, ranked choice not included. Carried. Vote on amended motion to vote on 23 paid delegates for national convention. Discussion. Carried. Motion: English made a motion to split the money for state convention to all paid delegates. Seconded: Shay. Carried.

New Business: Officer nominations, Norton recused himself for VP Betty Nash to ask for nominations for president. Don Cadwell nominated Norton for president of Branch 82; he won by acclamation. All other nominations followed. (See voters' guide in this issue.) Norton said all candidates will have an opportunity to speak at the November General Membership meeting.

Jamie Partridge made a motion to endorse the No Kings rally on October 18th- to endorse and bring the banner. Seconded: Arrowsmith. Carried. Partridge made a motion to endorse Sanctuary Status. He said he got a request from a city councilor to have unions endorse making sanctuary status a law rather than a code. Motion to endorse codification of City's sanctuary status into law. Seconded: Austin. Carried.

Thomas made a motion to do ranked choice voting for the paid delegates to the national convention. Seconded: Arrowsmith. Discussion. Motion fails.

Trustee's Financial Report: English said trustees are mostly done with inventory since the move. He welcomed new member Harris who replaced Ryan Mills in the trustee position.

Health Benefits and MBA Report: Eric Matras said the Health Fair will be on Thursday, November 20. Three sessions. Open Season is November 10 through December 8th. He encouraged the membership to join the NALC plan. "Don't go corporate, go union."

#### **Labor Management Report:**

Norton spoke on route adjustment reviews in several offices. Beaverton S&DC, Evergreen recently done. There won't be any other route adjustments this year. The Postal Service is still hiring despite the government shutdown. Mgmt wants to go down to one piece of casing equipment in the case, and the branch will fight it. He said that national should be fighting these ideas.

Health and Safety Report: Safety Officer Cadwell spoke about a carrier who got shot in Washington by an Amazon driver. National has sent a response team. He said the carrier is recovering but to keep him in mind. Mgmt continues to watch our seat belt use. He spoke about After Darks and said to prepare with headlamps. Safety captain meetings are every other Friday, 8am.

MDA Report: Abe RedCloud spoke about Fill the Satchel at NW Priority Credit Union. You can donate online if you are already a member.

Veterans Report: Hall said he picked up more boxes of food and took twenty to the air base because they adopted the 142nd wing. The National Guard folks don't get paid in a government shutdown. He reminded us that the Portland Veterans Day Parade is canceled.

Partridge made a motion to extend the meeting by up to 10 minutes. Seconded: English. Carried.

Labor Solidarity Report: Partridge spoke about the Canadian Postal Workers Union and Kaiser nurses and techs. New Seasons' and Starbucks' workers are gearing up to go on strike.

Good of the Association: Calendars are here. Norton thanked Harris for the meal. He said we need people to cook for the next few meetings. Sign up is in the kitchen.

Kitty Award: Nash won \$111. Jackpot: \$195 went unclaimed by Matt Van Harpen, Sellwood. Treasure Chest: \$300 went unclaimed by Chris Mendoza, Aloha
